

WRITERS WORKSHOP WRITING MONOLOGUE FOR PERFORMANCE

This workshop offers an interactive session on 'found poetry' and writing responsively to other texts and artworks, inviting participants to transform existing texts and documents into poems through methods such as cut-up or collage, blackout or erasure, with further exercises in emulation and response.
